Confession and Absolution

The apostle Paul prays that we may be established blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Let us, therefore, come before God in repentance, confessing our sins and seeking His mercy, that our hearts may be prepared for His coming.
- Almighty God, we come before You with humble hearts, confessing that we have sinned against You in thought, word, and deed. We have not loved You with our whole heart, nor have we loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have failed to watch and pray, to walk in holiness, and to abound in love toward others as You command. 





Sunday Advent Worship Series – **A Real Christmas**: A parent says, "I want to give my kids a real Christmas." What do you think that parent means? Perhaps they are thinking of trimming a freshly cut tree, finding the perfect presents, or spending the holidays with extended family. Perhaps they are thinking about all those things. "Then it will be a real Christmas!"

Certainly, all those are wonderful things. However, none of them are what makes Christmas real. The sad truth is Christmas is the most beloved holiday of so many, yet so few know what Christmas is really about.

If you want a real Christmas, then you need to observe Advent. Advent is Latin for "coming." In the season of Advent, Christians observe the connection between the first time the Son of God came into our world as the Savior and the second time He will come as the Judge. Advent prepares our minds and hearts, so that we might soon celebrate a real Christmas.

Our worship in the season of Advent follows this path:

First Sunday in Advent (December 1)

A Real Christmas Requires Remembering Why Christ Came

Second Sunday in Advent (December 8)

A Real Christmas Is Rooted in Repentance

Sermon Text: Luke 3:1-14

Third Sunday in Advent (December 15)

A Real Christmas Restores Hope in a Broken World

Sermon Text: Luke 7:18-28

Fourth Sunday in Advent (December 22)

A Real Christmas Will Lift Up the Lowly

Sermon Text: Luke 1:39-55

Join us in worship this Advent season to prepare for a truly meaningful celebration of our Savior's birth!

Advent Midweek Services: "The Christmas Trees of Scripture": The most widely recognized symbol of the season—the Christmas tree—has deep connections to our faith. While other religions used evergreen branches to symbolize eternal life, it was the Lutherans of 16th-century Germany who began the tradition of bringing evergreen trees indoors during the holidays. They adorned the trees with red ornaments, representing the blood of Christ, and with candles, symbolizing the light of Christ. The tree was often topped with a star or angel, pointing to the story of Jesus' birth. The Christmas tree is a cherished part of our celebration of Christ's coming.

In our Midweek Advent Services, we will focus on some "Christmas trees" found in Scripture. These are not evergreens, nor are they decorated with lights or ornaments, but they point us to the Christ and the salvation He brings. These trees remind us why the birth of Jesus Christ is so worthy of celebration.

Advent Devotion: Waiting in Hope

"And not only that, but we also glory in tribulations, knowing that tribulation produces perseverance; and perseverance, character; and character, hope. Now hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us." (Romans 5:3-5 NKJV)

Advent is a season of waiting. We light candles, sing carols, and read prophecies that point to the coming of Christ. It is a time to prepare our hearts, not just for the celebration of Jesus' birth, but for His promised return. The world sees waiting as a burden. Yet, for Christians, waiting is an exercise in hope.

The apostle Paul reminds us that hope is not idle or empty. It is not the wishful thinking of a world that crosses its fingers, hoping for luck. No, hope is rooted in God's faithfulness and fueled by His promises. Paul connects hope with perseverance, a quality forged in tribulation. As we endure trials, our character is refined, and hope is deepened. This hope, Paul declares, "does not disappoint."

Why? Because our hope is anchored in the love of God, a love so profound that He sent His only Son to redeem us. Advent is the story of this love, from the promise spoken in Eden to the cry of a baby in Bethlehem. Every moment of waiting throughout Scripture—from Abraham's longing for a son, to Israel's yearning for deliverance, to the centuries of silence before Jesus' birth—reveals God's faithfulness to His promises. He always comes through.

As we wait during this Advent season, we do so with the confidence that God is at work. Our world, like our hearts, may often feel weary and broken. But God's Word assures us that Christ is coming again. The King who entered our world in humility will return in glory to make all things new.

So, as we light each candle this Advent, let it remind us of the light of Christ that shines in the darkness. Let it rekindle our hope in His promises, for He has not abandoned us. He is with us now, and He will come again.

While we wait, we live as those transformed by His love, reflecting His light in a darkened world. And as we persevere, we do so with this blessed assurance: "Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:13 NKJV)

Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly! Amen.

+ Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions +

December 2 - December 7

Monday: Luke 1:5-25 – How did God prepare for Christmas? He sent an angel to announce the coming of the promised forerunner, John. Even Zechariah's doubt could not hinder God's plan to bring hope and salvation through Jesus. Consider how God's promises remain certain even when human faith falters.

Tuesday: Colossians 1:15-23 – Jesus, the image of the invisible God, is not only the agent of creation but also the Redeemer of all things. Through His blood shed on the cross, we are reconciled and made holy. This Advent, let this truth deepen your worship and anticipation of His coming.

Wednesday: Isaiah 40:1-11 — The prophet foretells a voice crying in the wilderness to prepare the way for the Lord. God's comfort and mercy come to His people through the tender shepherding of His promised Messiah. Reflect on how Christ gently leads and carries you as one of His lambs.

Thursday: Genesis 3:1-15 — The tragedy of the Fall reminds us of humanity's disobedience, which brought sin and death into the world. In response, God gave His first Gospel promise, assuring that a Savior would come to crush the serpent's head. This promise was fulfilled in Jesus Christ, whose coming brings victory over sin and death for all people.

Friday: Psalm 85 – This psalm beautifully combines the themes of Advent —repentance, restoration, and hope. God's steadfast love and faithfulness meet in Christ, the One who brings peace and salvation. As you prepare for His coming, pray for His righteousness to dwell in your heart.

Saturday: Proverbs 8:22-36 – The Wisdom of God speaks of its role in creation and delight in humanity. Christ, the eternal Word, is this Wisdom personified (John 1:1-14). As we celebrate His incarnation, let us rejoice that He became flesh to rescue and redeem us.
